
Results from the 2025 Annual Parental Survey


This year there was a total of 10 responses to our survey.






20% have not raised any concerns. 80% agree/strongly agree concerns raised have been dealt with properly.

This is how we used to run PE days, however we made the decision last year to bring kit into school for a rang of reasons, including teaching children life skills such as dressing/undressing, organisation of own items; safeguarding; we are then able to do PE lessons or be physically active at unplanned times, whereas when it is set to specific days this isn't possible; children always have a change of clothes in school should they require it.
