Class One News

Class One have returned to school ready for the new term. Although tired at the end of the week, they have already begun new topics with enthusiasm. They enjoyed the pantomime of Treasure Island – oh yes they did! It was a good experience for the children to be able to watch and participate in a live performance.

We have begun to read our new text 'The Way Back Home' by Oliver Jeffers. We'll continue to use this book as a stimulus for our writing. In PE we have begun a unit of Dance. The children have shared what they know about travelling over and through water and are helping to create a dance about it over the next few weeks.

In some of our end of the day reading sessions, we are starting to think about non-fiction texts and are looking at a variety of features found in them such as contents, index and glossary pages as well as headings, labels and captions. We're spending time looking in books borrowed from our school library and also some of our phonics reading books. The next time your child accesses a non-fiction book, please support them in looking for these features and discuss with them why the features are useful.
